St. Wilfrid was born in Northumbria c.634 A.D and died c.709 A.D. As Bishop of York he was the first English bishop to appeal to the Pope. Although reinstated in York, he fell out again with the king and other bishops. He ministered in the East Midlands and finally at Hexham.

Wednesday 13th October

10am Mass, Saint Edward the Confessor (Memoria)

St. Edward the Confessor became king of England in 1042 A.D. He was remarkable for his help to the poor. He died on the 5th January 1066 A.D.

St. Teresa of Jesus (of Avila) was born in 1515 and entered the Carmelite Order, making progress in the way of perfection and receiving mystical revelations. She undertook the reform of the Order, against great opposition. She died in 1543.

Action on the Assisted Dying Bill

Bishop John Sherrington, Lead Bishop for Life Issues for the Catholic Bishops' Conference of England and Wales, has written an open letter inviting Catholics to pray for the defeat of the Assisted Dying Bill, due to be debated in the House of Lords in October. It encourages us to write to peers at the House of Lords stating the reasons why we oppose this legislation and particularly explain from personal experience the reasons why this change in the law should be opposed. Discussion and communication about this important matter is vital for the defeat of the Bill and in our diocese, Bishop John is asking all parishioners to act now by praying, writing and sharing.
